Welcome to this video tutorial on the Internet Assisted Review (IAR) Module.

Research grants are considered for funding by NIH and its partner agencies based upon the peer review of applications conducted by scientists.

The Internet Assisted Review system provides reviewers a tool to electronically view grant applications, submit critiques and score the applications they are reviewing, and perform other review related activities

Before reviewing the applications in detail, reviewers need to attend to policy concerns, so IAR is the place to sign a confidentiality agreement; indicate whether or not one is a federally registered lobbyist, since federally registered lobbyists cannot serve on a review panel; and most importantly, leave any conflicts at the door.

While in the IAR system, reviewers can access their Personal Profile to take care of the personal information related to the review, such as ensuring a proper email address is on file to receive review related correspondence; or signing up for reviewer reimbursements.

IAR is accessed via eRA Commons, which means reviewers must have a Commons account to use IAR. Note that reviewers cannot access applications in IAR until they are invited to a meeting by the SRO.

If a reviewer already has an account as a PI, he or she will be assigned the IAR role when invited to the meeting.

If the reviewer is new to eRA Commons, the meeting invitation will walk him or her through the process of creating a new account.

If the reviewer has previously served as a reviewer, he or she can use the existing eRA Commons account.
